To Whom It May Concern:

I first met Laszlo Marosi when doing some guest conducting in Hungary. A friend of mine who was working at that time for Editio Musica Budapest, told me about this very talented young conductor who was conducting the Central Army Orchestra, an ensemble I later came to know as Hungary's leading wind band. We subsequently met and everything, superlatives and all, exceeded my expectations. Marosi was and is a remarkable talent.

Over the next decade our paths crossed with greater frequency, particularly during the time we served on the Board of the World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensemble. He was also doing more conducting in the United States, continuing to conduct the Central Band and teaching conducting at the Liszt Academy. It was while observing him teach a conducting class at the Academy and rehearsing both amateur and professional ensembles alike that I knew he demonstrated more than just musical gifts. He was a positive, nurturing, demanding and always courteous and patient leader.

I encouraged him to consider study in the United States, suggesting that his future might be better served in this country. I also indicated that he could easily fit into any number of DMA conducting programs but it would be counter productive for, in my judgment, he was already overqualified for that degree. I suggested that he look at the PhD in Music Education and prepare for a career that would include not only what he already knew so well but would assist him in becoming an even more effective model for music education students as well. It will come as no surprise that I recommended the Music Education program at The Florida State University and arranged for his study here.

He spent a year of intensive language study that prepared him for the TOFAL examination, which he passed with flying colors. He was already comfortable with German, Italian, Russian and French. He also visited, observed and evaluated current practices in the schools, attended conferences and demonstrated in our teacher education program. I suspect that he will probably always have a slight difficulty with the language but not in terms of comprehension or the ability to express himself. His writing skills improve dramatically by the week. His industry is formidable. I can assure you that this acquired language does not get in the way of very effective teaching of concepts or sensitive and exciting music making.

It is unnecessary for me to review his professional vita for his credentials speak volumes and I am confident that his other references will unhesitatingly support my observations. I would like to note that he has considerable administrative experience in dealing with policy, personnel, budgeting and scheduling.

We asked him to join our faculty as a Visiting Assistant Professor to cover a variety of teaching and administrative responsibilities during my last year at FSU. Thus, he taught my conducting and wind literature courses, supervised music education interns and conducted both wind and orchestral ensembles.

In the 52 years that I have taught, I have never worked or collaborated with a student or colleague who has more talent, a greater work ethic, the collegiality or the potential of Laszlo Marosi. Some institution is going to hire a teacher/conductor who will add an important musical and educational dimension to their student's lives. He is truly special.

The above was written prior to his accepting the orchestra position at the University of Central Florida. I am confident that there would be unanimity by that faculty of the tremendous impact he has had on that program. He is truly remarkable.

I first met Dr Laszlo Marosi in the summer of 2001 when we were both engaged as conductors on the Wind Music Week at the prestigious Canford Summer School of Music in England. We conducted the Wind Orchestra and coached student conductors in a varied programme of music, including some of my own compositions. We have since met annually on similar courses, where we have shared the conducting responsibilities.

I am always impressed with Laszlo's preparation and knowledge of all the scores we have worked on, though, when "thrown in at the deep end" and confronted with music he is unfamiliar with, he copes magnificently. 
